W8P Spreads the Word about End Polio Now

On Saturday and Sunday, February 23-24, 2013. amateur radio operators gathered at WA2HOM, the amateur radio station at the Ann Arbor Hands-On Museum. We were there to operate special event station W8P to commemorate the founding of the Rotary Club on February 23, 1905 and spread the word about Rotary International's End Polio Now Campaign (www.endpolio.org).

The goal of the End Polio Now program is to rid the world of this terrible disease. Rotary International launched this program in 1985, and with the aid of UNICEF, the World Health Organization, and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has cut the number of cases by more than 99.9%. In 1988, polio was endemic in 125 countries. In 2012, polio is endemic in only two regions. We like to say that we're "this close" to eradicating polio.

The unique part of the special operating event is that stations all over the world took part in it.
Rotary is an international organization, and its amateur radio fellowship, Rotarians on Amateur Radio (ROAR), includes members all over the world. In Australia, a group operated the special event station VI4POLIO. In Europe.

Pertti, past president of ROAR, operated his station, EA7GSU. Here in the States, a group that included yours truly; Jack, N8PMG; Jameson, KD8PIJ; Dinesh, AB3DC; and Mark, W8MP operated W8P.

Since the museum is only open from 1500Z -2200Z, we were only able to operate for seven hours on Saturday. We spent all of our time on 20m phone, with our beam pointed southwest, concentrating on working mostly U.S. stations. We had originally intended to operate on 14.287 MHz, but quickly had to change frequencies, as that portion of the band was occupied by participants in the Mississippi QSO party. We finally ended up on 14.227 MHz and made a total of 110 contacts on Saturday. This included 29 states and four DX contacts.

On Sunday, we only operated for a couple of hours and made another 27 contacts. While we made fewer contacts on Sunday, the contacts that we did make were more poignant than the ones on Saturday.

My first contact on Sunday was with a gentleman who was spending the winter in Florida, but whose hometown was Standish, Michigan. He told me that his mother had polio, and in the late 1930s and early 1940s, they would put her on a bus for Ann Arbor, where she would receive treatments. While there's no way to be sure. I think that this ham's mother was taking part in some of the research leading to the Salk vaccine in 1955. That research took place right here at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. I also talked to hams that had direct experience with polio. One was a polio survivor himself. Another's wife was a polio survivor. A third was a physician who had been to Africa and had treated polio victims there.

It was a real treat to combine two activities that I enjoy so much—amateur radio and Rotary—and it felt good to know that in some small way I was furthering the work of the End Polio Now campaign. I hope that next year we will once again operate this special event and get even more Rotarians and amateur radio operators to participate.

Spring is here astronomically and eventually the temperature will reflect that fact more. Hopefully you all made it out to Skywarn® training this vear if you have never gone or have not attended in two vears. Portage has one in Ravenna on April 4th and for those interested in more of the scientific aspects in severe weather The Pittsburgh NWS will have an Advanced Class over in Mercer County April 4th 630PM at the Mercer County Dept of Public Safety, details on Pitt NWS site. Please remember when there is a Severe Weather Net on the W8QLY 146.745 repeater to listen before transmitting. If there is not a warning issued yet for Mahoning County but there is for neighboring ones, then the repeater will probably be in a loose net mode. This means transmissions are not being directed to net control, but if you're having a conversation try to keep it short and leave long pauses in case someone needs to bring up the net or someone has emergency traffic from one of the borders. Make sure to listen before speaking, because if there is a net in progress you do not want to interrupt. Also, if there is a question posed; let the net control operator handle all the traffic. This cuts down on unnecessary radio communications on the frequency during a need. Once a net is in progress, before you transmit your info, take a

moment to think what you

are going to say before you key up.

The only reports that they will want are:

- 1. Tornado, funnel cloud, or wall cloud (location and direction of travel)
- 2. Hail of any size, severe size is 1 inch and up so quarter size, please reference hail size with pocket change, if you can't do an actual measurement.
- Actual wind damage, trees downs (what size, healthy or dead), measured winds 45 MPH or more.
- Flooding more than 1 foot of standing water or flowing water which might lead to flash flooding.
- 5. <u>Death or serious</u> injury from the weather.

There may be occasions where they may ask for other reports for the National Weather Service.

Keep an eye to the sky. All help is appreciated!

Online basic training, won't replace live training but it will familiarize you to the basics. While watching the presentation online keep in mind this is for Norman, OK area and not NE Ohio.
