When I needed to remodel my dad's house for the impending arrival of my octogenarian aunt, who would be moving in, it was Jim and Al Avnet AB8AA who came to my son's aid in restructuring the bathroom and bedroom area. In every way, he was a gentleman and a true friend--who became more. Hence, the joining together of the two call signs in December 2004. Then he joined me in my Primerica business, and what a great help he is there! Amazing guy. Who else but Jim could stay strong through the deaths of his daughter, then his mom, then his wife, and then his best friend, in 1999-2002. How did he hold it together? By reaching out and helping others with their struggles. 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Straight Key Night: A Return to the Basics

ARRL Straight Key Night ([SKN](#)) returns on January 1, 2015 (0000 to 2359 UTC), offering a chance for many to get back to their Amateur Radio roots. Those operators who began their years in Amateur Radio restricted to CW on the old Novice bands used some sort of manual key to send. Straight Key Night is an opportunity to relive those "brass-pounding" experiences. This 24-hour event is not a contest but a day dedicated to celebrating our CW heritage.

Participants are encouraged to get on the air and simply enjoy conversing in CW, with

the use of a straight — or hand — key or bug for sending preferred. Some enhance the fun by using vintage radio gear. No points are scored, and everyone who participates is a winner!

Straight Key Night participants may use all authorized Amateur frequencies, but activity has traditionally been centered on the HF bands.

Call "SKN" instead of "CQ" to solicit contacts, and use SKN instead of RST when transmitting signal reports. These tip off passers-by that you're taking part in Straight Key Night and

may lead to additional contacts. When the event is over, you're invited to vote for the operator with the "best fist" or sending style (this does not have to be someone you worked) and for "most interesting QSO." The results will be tabulated and included in the results. Send your information to straightkey@arri.org.

New Element 3 (General Class) Question Pool Released

The Question Pool Committee of the National Conference of Volunteer Examiner Coordinators ([NCVEC](#)) has released the 2015-2019 Element 3 (General Class) question pool. The new question pool becomes effective for all Element 3 examinations administered on or after July 1, 2015, and it remains valid until June 30, 2019.

“Amateur Radio Parity Act” Campaign Will Resume in New Congress



Largely as the result of a grassroots campaign, “The Amateur Radio Parity Act of 2014” ([H.R. 4969](#)) attracted the support of 69 members of the US House of Representatives in addition to that of its sponsor, Rep Adam Kinzinger (R-IL). While the soon-to-adjourn 113th Congress did not enact the bill, the effort to gain passage of the legislation will resume anew when the 114th Congress convenes in January. Introduced with bipartisan support last June, H.R. 4969 called on the FCC to apply the “reasonable accommodation” three-part test of the [PRB-1](#) federal pre-emption policy to private land-use restrictions regarding antennas. The limited PRB-1 pre-emption currently applies only to state and municipal land-use ordinances. The FCC has indicated its reluctance to provide the same legal protections from private land-use agreements — often called covenants, conditions, and restrictions or CC&Rs — without direction from Congress. ARRL Regulatory Information Manager Dan Henderson, N1ND, this week stressed that the fight is not over.

“While we are disappointed that the bill did not make it through the process during the

session, the effort was extremely energized by the efforts of thousands of ARRL members who participated in our grassroots lobbying effort,” Henderson said. “In just 6 short months we gained tremendous traction for the Amateur Radio Parity Act.”

Henderson explained that sometime after the new Congress is called into session in January, a new “Amateur Radio Parity Act” bill with a new number will be introduced into the US House. “Once this happens, the ARRL will gear up for a fresh effort to push this legislation forward,” he added.

In a note to ARRL Section Managers this week, ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ, thanked Section leaders and Field Organization volunteers on behalf of the ARRL Board of Directors and Headquarters staff for their help in garnering legislative support for H.R. 4969. “We had hoped to gain 30 co-sponsors for the bill and ultimately ended up with 69, plus the sponsor,” Sumner noted. “The overwhelming majority of these 70 supporters are returning in January, which gives us a good base on which to grow additional support.”

Sumner said the objective

for 2015 is to continue the momentum, gathering enough support to move the bill through the Energy and Commerce Committee. “We have received expressions of interest from the Senate side and are hoping to have the bill introduced there as well,” he added.

Henderson said the bill would not have attained its current level of support in the US House without the thousands of letters and phone calls made by ARRL members to their congressional representatives. “The success of this crucial issue relies on the efforts of *all* radio amateurs and ARRL members,” he said. “We know you will step forward in the new year, when we renew our efforts on Capitol Hill.”

ARTSAT2: DESPATCH Satellite is Now FO-81



AMSAT-NA has designated the [ARTSAT2: DESPATCH](#) (DEep SPace Amateur Troubadour's CHallenge) satellite as Fuji OSCAR 81 or FO-81. OSCAR Number Administrator Bill Tynan, W3XO, said the Japanese deep-space satellite "appears to have met all of the requirements for an OSCAR number, including IARU coordination." Tynan said he applied the "Fuji" designation "in recognition of the long history of contributions the Japanese have made to Amateur Radio satellites."

Launched on December 3, FO-81 is the second spacecraft in the ARTSAT series. It went into space with the Hayabusa-2 asteroid probe. A primary mission of DESPATCH is to collect signals from the spacecraft from around the world and to [reconstruct](#) the original data transmitted from the spacecraft. "Reception of such weak signals to reconstruct data from the spacecraft will require the expertise of exceptionally skilled ham operators," the satellite's developers have said in seeking the cooperation radio amateurs around the world.

Boy Scouts Recognize ARRL Amateur Radio Service to Scouting Award



The Boy Scouts of America's National Awards and Recognition Committee has officially recognized the ARRL "Amateur Radio Service to Scouting Award" as part of its family of [Community Organization awards](#). The ARRL award recognizes actively involved Scouting leaders who make a significant contribution to providing Scouts with a memorable and valuable Amateur Radio experience. This program allows Scouting leaders to wear the Community Organization Award square knot on their uniform, in recognition of their service within their community organization.

"This is yet another step in ARRL-BSA cooperation, one that will recognize the Scouting leaders who have worked tirelessly to introduce the science, technology, fun, and excitement of Amateur Radio to the youth involved in Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting, and Venturing," the Boy Scouts organization said in announcing its formal recognition of the League award.

This award was officially established through a resolution adopted by the ARRL Board at its 2013 Annual Meeting. It builds on the long relationship between the BSA and ARRL that began with the development of the Wireless Merit Badge in 1918 — now the Radio Merit Badge. This relationship was formally recognized through a 2011 [Memorandum of Understanding](#) (view a [video](#) of the signing).

[Nominations](#) for the Amateur Radio Service to Scouting Award are made through the appropriate ARRL Section Manager. A nominee must meet five of 10 requirements. The requirements range from teaching the Radio Merit Badge to participating in the Jamboree On The Air (JOTA), to providing communications support for Scouting events. Scout leaders cannot nominate themselves.

Currently 18 other organizations are included within the BSA's Community Organization Award program.

ARRL's Logbook of The World Tops 100 Million QSL Records!

The ARRL's Logbook of The World ([LoTW](#)) online "card-less" contact-confirmation service this week recorded a new milestone — 100 million QSL records out of some 630 million uploaded contacts. That's an increase of more than 18 million QSL records since the end of last year. First described conceptually in the October 2001 *QST* "It Seems to Us..." editorial, Logbook of The World launched in September 2003. Since then, it has become an accepted Amateur Radio institution — perhaps not at the same level of traditional QSL cards, but close and gaining. The 100 million contact confirmations, ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ, pointed out, is the equivalent of 200 million QSL cards.

"If placed end to end, that many QSLs would reach more than 17,000 miles — not quite all the way around the world, but enough to qualify as a 'long-path' QSO," he quipped. ARRL COO Harold Kramer, WJ1B, pointed out that using LoTW can mean a considerable saving in postage for DXers and others over the expense of exchanging QSL cards.

LoTW was an instant success. Within 2 weeks of its debut, the service already had some 2200

registered users and had confirmed some 51,000 contacts out of more than 8 million uploaded. The number of users today number more than 72,000 — up by nearly 10,000 this year alone.


Over LoTW's 11-year lifetime, many logging programs have incorporated features to enable them to interface smoothly with LoTW. Several awards programs, starting with the ARRL DX Century Club ([DXCC](#)) award, now rely largely on LoTW to determine whether an applicant has met the award's requirements. It's also made it easier for award seekers to track their progress. LoTW is the primary means to confirm ARRL [Centennial QSO Party](#) contacts. The service also supports [YUCC](#), [WAS](#), and [WPX](#).

LoTW is open to all; ARRL membership is not required in order to use LoTW. [Applying](#) for a digital certificate is the first step toward taking advantage of the system. The digital certificate authenticates the user's identity. The digital certificate is free, and LoTW only charges when users apply credits toward an award.

Once they have registered and have a valid

certificate, users can digitally sign log uploads via the Internet. If the information in a submitted QSO matches the information submitted to LoTW by the other station, LoTW credits both operators and will display the submitted QSO as [confirmed](#).

A call sign certificate authenticates a specific, registered user as the source of each submitted contact, and other users may not see information submitted by other operators. This combination maintains the integrity of the contact verification process that has long been the hallmark of ARRL awards programs.



Financial Woes Reported at Dayton Hamvention® Venue, Hara Arena

[Hara Arena](#) — for many years the home of [Dayton Hamvention®](#) — is facing some financial issues and has cut back on its full-time staff to save money, according to a WDTN-TV “2 News” [account](#). The Dayton TV station reported on December 2 that the Trotwood complex now has a full-time staff of only 12 employees. Karen Wampler, Hara’s Director of Marketing, told the TV station that it’s difficult for Hara Arena to compete with other Miami Valley venues, such as the Nutter Center at Wright State University, but she hinted at a positive announcement next year.

“As taxpayers, we’re competing against facilities that are subsidized by tax dollars, and because of that, we are struggling to compete,” Wampler said. “The primary challenges are that we need renovation dollars, and the ownership model needs to be changed.” The Wampler family has owned and operated Hara Arena since its humble origins in the 1950s, when Wampler Ballarena — then a dance hall, now an exhibit hall familiar to Hamvention visitors — was built in what had been a family-owned orchard. Hara Arena has since expanded to a 165,000 square foot, six-building complex.

Last year Hara Arena hosted 239 events, including Hamvention, generating an estimated \$34 million in community revenue. Wampler told 2 NEWS that the arena is working with a company called [VenuWorks](#), which specializes in restoring event venues, and she anticipated some “very, very, good news in 2015.”

Hara Arena has hosted everyone from The Rolling Stones and Kid Rock to President George W. Bush over the years. It is home to the Dayton Demonz hockey team.

“There’s a lot of history,” Wampler said. Hara Arena was named by founding brothers HARold and RALph Wampler.

Last year, Dayton Hamvention, sponsored by the Dayton Amateur Radio Association, attracted nearly 25,000 visitors.
